# PRESIDENT'S REPORT Dick Cataldi

Now is the time to register for next year's election. A notice, with address, is located elsewhere in this issue of the Dispatch. The letter of nomination should include a list of qualifications. Don't worry about the prose and grammer, as a member of the elections committee will work with candidates to put together information on each candidate for publication prior to the election.

One last time: the positions up for election in 1981 are President, Treasurer, and Regional Vice Presidents (Eastern, Central, and Pacific.) A small change in regional boundaries was recently approved by the Board of Trustees and appears in this assue so that you will know for sure which region you live in. The only people affected are those who live in states that have two time zones in them.

In addition to the election of officers, the 1981 ballot will include two motions to amend the NASG constitution. These are also shown elsewhere this month. Motion 1 would transfer the establishment of annual dues from the constitution to the by-laws. The by-laws can be amended by the Board of Trustees, making it possible for the Board to raise (or lower) the dues in response to economic conditions and organization programs. As a practical matter, the Board would very probably raise the annual dues as soon as this amendment takes effect if it passes.

Motion 2 would make winners of the Bernie Thomas Memorial Award prior to 1976 lifetime members of NASG, Inc., like those winners of the award since 1976, when the organization was incorporated.

If you have an opinion on one or both of these constitutional amendments, please rite to the editor and share your opinions with the membership.

Several manufacturers are cooking up a great way to ease the pain of higher dues When they get the details worked out, we'll

have a report on it. Another area of revenue raising being explored is advertising space in this newsletter. We've started this with the booster club and are considering selling institutional-type ads for manufacturers and suppliers. It would be nice to be able to make the Dispatch self-supporting, especially if it can be done without making it look like the neighborhood advertiser. Any ideas or comments?

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT QUESTIONS

There will be two proposed amendments to the constitution of the National Association of S Gaugers, Inc., to be voted on in the ballot that will be mailed to all members of the NASG, Inc., on April 15, 1981. Both proposed changes come under Article II - Membership, and Section 1 of that article, describing types of membership.

Question 1 proposes changing paragraphs A and B from the following wording:

A. Regular Membership: Any individual S Gauger may become a Regular Member of the NASG upon application to the Treasurer and payment of dues of five dollars per year.

B. Contributing Membership: Any individual, or S Gauge affiliation such as a club, manufacturer, supplier, or publisher may become a Contributing Member of the NASG upon application to the Treasurer and payment of dues of ten dollars per year. to the following wording:

A. Regular Membership: Any individual may become a Regular Member of the NASG upon application to the Treasurer or his representative and payment of dues as set forth in the By-Laws..

B. Contributing Membership: Any individual or group such as a club, manufacturer, supplier, or publisher may become a Contributing Member of the NASG upon application to the Treasurer or his representative and payment of dues as set forth in the By-Laws.

The net effect of this proposal would be to drop the unenforcable requirement that members be S gaugers, allow the Treas-

urer to have a representative collect the dues, and move the dues to the By-Laws, which can be amended by the Board of Trustees.

Question 2 proposes changing para-

graph C from the following wording:

C. Honorary Membership: In recognition for meritorious service to S Gauge or the NASG, any person may be elected as recipient of the Bernie Thomas Memorial Award by a vote of the majority of the Board of Trustees. This award shall be presented annually and carry with it conference of Honorary Membership in the National Association of S Gaugers, Inc., which shall be good for life.

to the following wording:

C. Honorary Membership: (1) In recognition for meritorious service to S Gauge or the NASG, any person may be elected as recipient of the Bernie Thomas Memorial Award by a vote of the majority of the Board of Trustees. This award shall be presented annually and carry with it conference of Honorary Membership in the NASG, Inc., which shall be good for life. (2) In recognition of their past accomplishments and meritorious service to S Gauge, any recipient of the Bernie Thomas Memorial Award previous to the incorporation date of NASG, Inc., shall be granted an Honorary Membership in NASG, which shall be good for life.

The effect of this proposal, to grant life membership to 8 individuals who won the Bernie Thomas Memorial Award prior to 1976.

#### REGIONAL ORGANIZATION

The Board of Trustees has approved the following new wording of Article IV of the Corporations By-Laws:

## ARTICLE IV -- REGIONAL ORGANIZATION

- 1. There shall be three NASG Regions as follows: A. Eastern Region -- The states of Alabama, Deleware, Connecticut, Florida Georgia, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia District of Columbia, Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario, and Europe.
- B. Central Region -- The states of Arkansas Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, and Wisconsin.
- C. Pacific Region -- The states of Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, and the provinces of Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, Northwest Territories, Saskathewan, the Yukon, and Australia.
- 2. The Board of Trustees shall reserve the right to apportion members of the NASG located in areas not supportive of a region organization into existing regions.

FROM THE MAIL SACK

I guess you've gotten my Newsletter by now, with the comments on the S gauge standards.

One thing should be added to the comments. In the past, these discussions have consistently missed is the utter dependency

of S scale on the existing inventory of hardware. Unlike HO, or even O, the flow of new products is slow and erratic. The typical HO hobbyists has few items over 5 years old; the typical O gauger will have a fair amount of material up to 10 years ol By way of contrast, a considerable percentage of S gauge material sold is 10 to 20 years old. How long will it take to phase in a "new" standard, if that standard were not wholly compatable with the "old" standard? There is a real danger of ending up with a third faction in S gauge - HiRail, "Old timers", and "the new wave" all of them incompatible in operation and outlook?

The S scale market is marginal now; split it in half and you may well kill it.

1981 NASG CONVENTION NEWS

The big news this issue is that arrangements have been made with Lionel to produce a special American Flyer Convention Car.

The following ad will appear in the November-December issue of the S Gaugian. 'In conjunction with the 1981 National Association S Gaugers (NASG) Convention, the Central New York S Gauge Association, Inc., host for the convention, is pleased to announce that arrangements have been made wi Fundimensions, manufacturer of Lionel and American Flyer, to produce a special American Flyer S gauge box car for the Convention. To our knowledge, this will be the first factory made American Flyer S gauge convention car ever produced. The car will be orange with black and white markings and feature sliding doors, die cast trucks with knuckle couplers and be in an American Flyer box. The car will be presold, as most organizations do with their convention cars and be distributed at the NASG Convention next July in Syracuse. For those unable to attend, the car will be shipped to them in late July, after the convention has concluded. Total production will be limited to the amount of cars presold. You DO NOT have to be a member of the NASG to order the car The cost of the car is \$22.00 and limited to one car per person. All orders must be received by December 27, 1980 with full payment enclosed.'

While we would have liked to limit the purchase of the car to NASG members only, there are just not enough members to do this and at the same time sell enougars. You'll note that there is a limit of one car per person mentioned in the ad This DOES NOT apply to NASG members. NASG


