RPO CAR....

To The Editor-NASG NEWSLETTER:

First, my compliments on the fine job you are doing. Having published a newsletter myself for two years and having written a regular magazine column for several years, I can appreciate the job and the product--congratulations.

To the members---we have a good start and a capable editor--lets feed him more material.

Steve Butler wants definitions of the various aspects of S-this has been done in the past but perhaps it is time to do it again. It is necessary to keep in mind that the borders between various interests are often fuzzy. Also, many people are into several or all of the following. Anyway, here are Porter's Pearls (boy, am I asking for it!).

1. TRAIN COLLECTOR:

- A. American Flyer only- wants one of everything (sometimes he seems to want <u>all</u> of everything) Gilbert ever produced in 3/16- better known as S. Usually also has interests in other scales--Standard, O, HO, etc. and other manufacturers-Lionel, Marx, Ives, etc.
- B. Brass -- mainly interested in brass display models; may concentrate on one scale or have many scales; if he buys kits he usually pays someone else to assemble them.
- C. S Scale Collector: wants one of everything (or all of everything) ever produced in and for S scale. In my experience he seldom assembles (or sells) anything.
- D. Various combinations of above-may also collect various letterings put out by Kris, Seltzer's, etc.
- 2. TIN-PLATER: Person who operates (has layout, plays with, uses) manufactured (as opposed to kit built or scratchbuilt) trains in any scale or gauge without modifying the wheel flanges, details, etc.
- 3. HI-RAILER: Person who operates modified tinplate equipment (in our case AF); sometimes in conjunction with a mixture of kit, converted, or scratch built items. By modified, I mean the AF stuff has at least been changed to so-called Hi-rail flanged wheels, which flanges are smaller and thinner than AF flanges but coarser and larger than "scale" flanges. This may also include but is not limited to removing cast-on oversize detail and replacing it with more "scale-like" details. The differences between Hi-rail and Scale are a matter of degree- the more one leans to NMRA standards, the closer one is to scale. Also, most Hi-railers will convert to direct current for control. However, the AF operator making mo change in his equipment except a change to DC would hardly have become a Hi-railer. Again, its a matter of degree.
- 4. SCALER: By far the largest group of model railroaders in all scales except S. (Here I am not including the kids who take the Lionel set out of the box, put it down on the rug, and then pack it away. I'm talking about people with permanent or

semi-permanent layouts.) Even in S we are seeing a gradual shift to scale as Hi-railers become more sophisticated and many AF operators are now changing to scale by disposing of or displaying their AF equipment rather than going thru the Hi-rail stage. What is Scale? Basically it is model railroad equipment generally adhering to NMRA standards. The size of equipment, details, wheel flanges, etc. are as close to a scale reduction from the real thing as is thought generally practical for most modelers and manufacturers. It is not a strict scale reproduction from the prototype.

- 5. Fine Scaler: Those who make no compromise. Wheel flanges are exact scale even if there are operational problems. Pipe sizes, for example, may be as fine as hair. Some modelers claim to achieve satisfactory operation with fine scale. That may well be, but the number of large, operating fine scale layouts is infinitismal.
- 6. NARROW GAUGER: Many confuse gauge with scale-years of using the words interchangable are to blame. Real railoads were built to many gauges. Real people are all built (grown?, created?) to the same scale. Thus a six foot person is six feet tall whether he rides AMTRAK (track gauge 4'-8½"), the Silverton in Colorado (track gauge 3') or the railway at the Milwaukee Zoo (track gauge 15"). Likewise, a model of a person will be the same size in Standard gauge or 3 foot Narrow gauge (S or Sn3) or in wide gauge for that matter, although I have never heard of a wide gauger in S scale. (There's a place for a very poor joke here but I'll ignore it! Hah!)

In summary, then, I would say

1. COLLECTOR: Collects trains to look at and trade with other collectors

2. TINPLATTER: Has American Flyer trains and his primaty interest is in operating them.

3. HI-RAILER: Has a mix of American Flyer and scale equipment running on flanges smaller than AF but larger than scale. Has probably gone to wider track radius than AF and changed some of the coarser details.

4. SCALER: Generally follows NMRA standards, especially in track and wheels.

5. FINE SCALER: Insists on a direct reduction from the prototype in all matters.

6. NARROW GAUGERS: Models railroads with a gauge of less than $4'-8\frac{1}{2}"$, usually in either scale or fine scale.

And remember, most of us are in more than one of the categories. Fun, isn't it?--now if I only had more time.

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
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THE HI RAIL COMMITTEE REPORT

First I want to thank all of you who sent in your comments on Lionel RTR S gauge.

Fundimensions has agreed to a meeting with us to discuss where we see S gauge going and what they, as the only major S gauge manufacturer, can do to help get it there.

S gauge can use a quality line of RTR train sets to expand the gauge. DC motors, improved drive systems, plastic trucks with needle bearings, operating knuckle couplers, pikemaster track, would compete directly and effectively with RTR HO gauge.

All S gaugers should sound off on RTR S gauge by Lionel!!!!!!

The Chicagoland Association Of S Gaugers is also making a well organized promotional effort to promote Lionel RTR S gauge.

We all remember the Westside Mikado project, also, the many reasons and opinions of why it failed, rumors indicate its not dead but waiting. The reintroduction by Lionel of the 0-6-0 Penn switcher, regeared and powered by a 5 pole DC motor could clear the track for brass S gauge RTR locomotives.

RTR S gauge by Lionel has sidetracked pending Hi Rail Projects at the present time.

Sig Fleischmann 22475 Violet Farmington, MI 48024 REPORT # 2 ON SURVEY NUMBER ONE: Here's the information you've been waiting for, concerning the ratings you and your friends made on the products you bought in the six months preceding our last survey. But first, a few introduct ory comments...

A total of <u>eighty</u> NASG members finally responded to this survey, with 65 arriving by the cut-off date for the last article. What a terrific response! Thanks again, friends! Will you do it again for the survey printed in this issue? (See the back page.) Of those 80, ten did not rate any manufacturers or dealers, 30 rated American Flyer dealers only, and 40 respondants rated scale modelling products. It is these 40 scale model ers whose responses I'm reporting in this article. (Total NASG membership stands at about 240, I believe).

These respondents rated 32 different manufacturers and dealers. Fourteen of these received three or more ratings, and are reported below. A numerical rating was asked of the price, quality, speed of delivery, and instructions provided, but most people rated only the last three items, and so I have no indication of people's opinions on the prices our manufacturers have to charge.

The fourteen manufacturers who received 3 or more ratings in any category are listed below in alphabetical order. The numbers in each column represent the total points scored, the number of ratings, and the average rating on a scale of one (low) to five (high).

Obviously, Trainstuff is the most popular manufacturer with NASG members, and receives high ratings in all areas, especially speed of delivery. But, Rex Models apparently gives very high quality with very good instructions, but you have to wait a while to receive their product. From this brief overview, it looks like our manufacturers put out high quality stuff. Why not sample their wares for yourself?
